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Booysen cleared of wrongdoing in shooting

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The provincial head of Serious and Violent Crime, Director Johan Booysen, did not act outside the law when he handed his firearm to another person during an armed robbery in Durban last week.

The head of South African Police Legal Services in KwaZulu-Natal, Assistant Commissioner Tommy Reed, said a section of the Arms and Ammunition Act made provision for possession and use of a firearm with the consent of the licence holder.

Last week Booysen walked into an armed robbery with his 16-year-old daughter, Natalie, in Technotronic Electronic Computer Store in Smith Street.

The owner, Aris Danikas, was held up by four men. Danikas and an assistant were forced into a back room by one of the robbers while the other three suspects looted the shop.

When Booysen walked in three of the robbers fled, but a fourth held Booysen and his daughter at gunpoint before fleeing with a bag containing computer equipment.

Booysen handed his firearm to Danikas, who is a police reservist.

Danikas shot and wounded the robber, who was later arrested.

Booysen has come under severe criticism for his action, which he has described as being tactical.

He said he was astonished to be made out to be a villain for handing over the firearm.

Reed said two principles in common law, namely necessity and private defence, would exclude any unlawful conduct on Booysen's part.

Reed said in a statement that he was fully satisfied with the explanation from Booysen, who he described as a brave and dedicated policeman.

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
